Comments from Other Persons Present

Beverly Martin
1491 Berkshire Road

Ms. Martin stated she was the owner of PAC Computers on Graham Road.

She had received a letter from Mrs. Zibritosky regarding the proposed Secondhand Dealer Licensing Ordinance. She had felt very threatened when she received it. There were a lot of things that she didn't understand.

She asked Council to table this legislation this evening and for them all to convene at PAC Computers on Wednesday, May 17th, at 2:30 p.m. She would very much like all of them to come and visit PAC.

She didn't know a lot of them. Many of them had stepped inside her shop. She wanted to prove to them her ability as an owner and the uprightness of her business.

Mr. Razor stated Ms. Martin was gracious to have him at her shop today. He was going to have some amendments to make to the ordinance. However, there would be nothing to vote on this evening.

Mrs. Zibritosky stated she had talked with Ms. Martin a little while ago. Part of that meeting was they would have a meeting with her and Chief Film. Therefore, she asked Council to refrain from making amendments until then.

They also had some other amendments they were working on with regards to other businesses. They wanted to make sure that they didn't conflict or contradict one another in any sort of way.

She requested that Mr. Razor send her an email so they could discuss his proposed amendments. Mr. Razor stated he would do that.

Beverly Jackson
1930 Echo Road

Ms. Jackson wanted to address Mayor Kline, the members of City Council and the City's Police Chief.

She offered kudos because on April 30th, she had called the dispatch non-emergency number of the police department. She had read an article in the newspaper that said that a gentleman had called it to their attention that a cell tower light had gone off near Stow High School. The cell tower that she saw out of her bedroom window has been off since December 20, 2013. Sue, the dispatcher, said that she would relay the message to Officer Murphy.

She told the dispatcher that she would be at the end of her driveway. She waited there for half-an-hour and the policeman finally called her and told her that he went around by Adell Durbin Park, called the 1-800 number, the light would be repaired and it would be on within 2-3 weeks. As of this date, the light is not on yet, but she knew they were working on it.

She wanted to tell Mayor Kline and City Council what a fine department they had and that two people followed-up on her request. She thought they deserved a brownie point for that.

Her next kudos goes to the Mayor's Secretary. Her name is Vicki. When she is away from her desk or at lunch, April takes over. She is kind. She is sweet. They answer all of her questions.

She wanted to volunteer to be on the Bridgestone Golf Classic for Team Sara. She called and asked if you had to be an employee to do that? Vicki returned her call and said no. Mayor Kline accepted her volunteering and she is going to join her team.

She also called to find out how to fix the apron of her driveway. It was repaired by the City of Stow in the late part of May of 2000. The City at that time had to put the pipe underneath the apron. People also had to use a contractor that was approved by the City. They don't have to do that anymore.

So she called Mr. Brooker. He answered her questions. In fact he had a gentleman come out and look at her apron. He told her that the pipe underneath her driveway was in ok condition. It was not rotted. It had not fallen. She could call any contractor. She was also allowed to use cement now instead of blacktop.

She thought Mr. Brooker should get an applause too. She didn't know who he reported to, but he was marvelous. Mayor Kline stated he reported directly to Mr. Wren. Ms. Jackson stated that Mr. Wren had a fantastic man.

Her fourth thing wasn't so pretty. Her property was on Echo Road. She had a two-car attached garage. She was one of those people who liked old muscle cars so she wanted to have a third bay built on her existing detached garage. So she called Mr. Kurtz.

First of all, Mr. Kurtz doesn't like to talk to females because he said that her existing garage was 900 sq. ft. She didn't know how a 20' x 20' garage could end up being 900 sq. ft. so she asked him what high school he went to? She went to Barberton. A 20' x 20' garage is not 900 sq. ft. And, she was only allowed to use up a maximum of 1,200 sq. ft.

The answer she got from him was he didn't know how he got that figure but he was looking at it. She asked him to come out and double check that she only had a 20' x 20' garage? He told her that he was too busy. So she told him that maybe they needed to get him an assistant.

She would even volunteer three hours a day. If he was overloaded with paperwork, she could input things on a computer. She had worked for 43 years in business in private industry. She retired at the age of 60. She was now on Medicare and Social Security. She had lots of free time.

She just wanted to tell the Mayor and City Council Members that she wasn't happy with his answers. He never did go to her house. Now she was not going to put a third bay on. In fact she thought she was going to sell her house and move south.

She thanked Mayor Kline and City Council for their time.

Mayor Kline stated she was sorry that Ms. Jackson and Mr. Kurtz did not have a good conversation. He was an exemplary employee and has always been very respectful.

Ms. Jackson stated not to her. He told her he would like to talk to her husband rather than her.

Mayor Kline stated she was sorry that the two of them did not have a good interaction. If they could help her with her garage, they would be happy to do that.

Ms. Jackson thanked everyone for their time.

Mr. Pribonic asked, regarding the cell towers, if the companies that controlled them were made to inspect them periodically? Mr. Wren stated technically they were required to. He thought there was an annual certification that they had to do.

They had a tower by the salt barn. A couple times a year their service workers were out there. He also knew they were out at Silver Springs Park because they used to be located at that building too.

He would assume maybe that maintenance worker just didn't take care of that. However, he knew they were out always checking their towers.

Mr. MacPherson introduced:

They were all members of the Speech and Debate Team.

This year they all qualified for the national tournament which was being held in Birmingham, Alabama on June 17th thru the 24th. It was a week-long tournament.

Unfortunately, they didn't receive any funding from the school, so they had to not only fund their trip to nationals, which was anywhere between \$5,000 and \$7,000 depending on airfare and the motel costs, but they also had to fund their entire season, which was an additional \$3,000 to \$5,000 depending on how many tournaments they go to.

They were going around to members of the community trying to find as many sources as they could to try and fundraise their trip to the nationals. That way they didn't have to pay for it out of their pockets.

Also their Coach, Mrs. Theisen, who had been coaching them for the past 28 years, was going to join them. They were very grateful for all of the help she gives them.

Last year the City made a big contribution to their trip to nationals. They could not have gone to the national tournament in Salt Lake City without the City's help last year.

He was proud to report that last year they had three different competitors go and they all placed top fifty in the nation out of a field of over 300 competitors. So they had a very good track record of success at the local and national tournaments.

They requested the City's help again. They held up a poster.

Mr. D'Antonio hoped City Council would support them. He knew the item would be considered very shortly.

He was glad that they had talked about their accomplishments from last year and in previous years. He was glad that they had contacted them for a donation.

Mr. Razor thought they had given a very good presentation.

Mayor Kline stated if they had a contact, address or email for members of the public to donate to the trip, if they would get that to her office Ms. Nahrstedt would put it on the City's Facebook Page to help publicize that for them so perhaps they could garner some more donations from members of the community. However, they did need some specifics. They could either get it to her office or to Ms. Nahrstedt directly.

Mr. D'Antonio stated he knew they had gotten money from the Community Foundation last year. He highly recommended that they contact them again. He was pretty sure there were three people present this evening that wouldn't say no.

Martin Tass

Mr. Tass stated it has been his distinct pleasure and honor to have served as the President of the Stow Community Foundation for the last two years. He was not sure how much the audience or anyone here was familiar with them, what they have done and what they stand for.

The Community Foundation was created in 1999. It was a group of businesses and community leaders to cumulate, manage and responsibly allocate resources to enhance the quality of life of the citizens of our two communities.

Since the creation of their foundation, their Board has made significant financial contributions to local needs, such as the people that just asked for some badly needed funds. He was sure at their meeting tomorrow they would accommodate them.

About two years ago their leadership got together with the City of Stow and tried to find out what was needed most by this community that they could help with. The vast majority of people that they talked to talked about a community gathering spot.

In March of this year, on the 14th in a snowstorm, they asked 100 groups to meet with them to review the plans that the City had paid for and reviewed. The OHM group did an excellent job. They took their plans and costs and presented it to those 100 groups within the community. They chose them because they thought that those groups in sum represented and touched in some way almost every citizen of Stow.

The response they got, which had appeared in the Stow Sentry, was significant, meaningful and heartfelt. Everybody told them what they thought, what they wanted, and what they thought they wanted and they came up with many ideas to crack the enormous nut of redeveloping this area.

He and his wife have lived here for forty years and nobody has complained more than they have that they had to go to Zeppy's last night to get a nice meal. They want development in Stow too. However, it is not an either/or process.

He agreed that it is not just the development economically of businesses, industries, stores and things like that which we badly need and want, but it is also the other half that we have already expended a lot of our treasury and time on as a community foundation to try and get the pulse of the public.

They want that also. They want the portion that Mr. Rasor had discussed. They want the portion that Mr. Pribonic had discussed. They want the portion that the Community Foundation had already spent a lot of time working on.

They want to continue to collaborate with your group and with any group on developing this area, because to be a homerun, to be complete, they need the open space, the gathering space and the stores and nice shops. They wanted to continue to work together. They could be a very valuable member of this team.

Mrs. Mumper stated she had a few questions.

She actually did want to know more about the Community Foundation. She asked the following questions:

- is it subsidized by any government entity;
- is it listed as a NGO;
- is it open to the public;
- how many members are there; and
- are they connected in any way to the OHM?

- did the City take out bids for the OHM;
- since Hudson and Kent have something similar and many other communities are doing this, will there be any kind of a study to see if they are glad that they did it;
- do they have any vacancies;
- are they still making their payments; and
- has it really proven to be beneficial to the community?

Mrs. Voros stated she had a question regarding development of this area. She asked if the Colman property wasn't donated to the City of Stow as a park? Mr. Wren stated it was not dedicated parkland. No area at the City Center Complex was dedicated parkland. Mr. Baranek stated the property wasn't specifically donated to the City. The City purchased it.

Mrs. Voros asked with the proposed city development would that walkway/park area be gone? Mayor Kline stated it was too soon to tell. That was why earlier she had gone thru an explanation of the process.

Certainly part of a successful development as Mr. Tass just talked about and Mr. Pribonic had referenced earlier is there has to be community gathering areas, walkability and an opportunity for people from neighboring areas to come on foot to this area. So she couldn't say yes or no, but certainly getting rid of all of those pads and closing them off is certainly not part of the vision that they had.

Again, all of that is part of the process of developing a vision, going out for RFPs, seeing what developers want to do and seeing if it comports with what the community and the City Officials have in mind for that area. It is publically-owned land so they do have that opportunity to say preserve this, preserve that, we want this, we don't want that and those sorts of things.
