

Minutes of the Regular Meeting of Stow City Council held on Thursday, February 8, 2018, at 7:00 p.m.

Call to Order

Mr. Riehl called the meeting to order and Mr. Razor led the prayer and pledge of allegiance.

Committee Reports

Mr. Costello reported on the Finance Committee Meeting of February 8, 2018 as follows:

Mr. Razor reported on the Roads & Safety Committee Meeting of February 8, 2018 as follows:

1. Two items would be introduced in legislative form.
2. In two weeks, they would give out their first Roads & Safety Committee Awards.

Mr. D'Antonio reported on the Public Improvements Committee Meeting of February 8, 2018 as follows:

1. Discussed a liquor application. No Public Hearing was requested.

Comments from Other Persons Present

Jeremy McIntire
3630 Darrow Road

Mr. McIntire stated he had missed the last Council Meeting but saw there was some legislation that came out about the creation of an Entertainment District.

He noticed thru the whole talks about developing the City Center, which he was all for, when he saw this map, this thing had almost tripled in size from what was initially proposed. He had thought the primary focus was for the area around City Hall, but now it was right thru his property clear down to Kent Road.

He asked why they needed 156 acres that encompassed this so called Entertainment District when Ohio Revised Code only required a minimum of 20 acres? Reading the legislation, it seemed like it was for the sole purpose of acquiring liquor licenses to attract new business.

He was all for that. However, it looked like there was about 57 acres around City Hall, which was more than enough to create this Entertainment District to acquire those licenses.

He asked if there was any reason why they needed to extend this district all the way down there? He asked for what reasons were they looking to extend it down there when the sole purpose of the liquor licenses was to attract businesses up here?

Mayor Kline stated Mr. Kurtz was not present this evening. She encouraged Mr. McIntire to call the office, pick a time to come-in and to talk with him to get some of his questions answered.

Also, in two weeks, at the next Council Meeting, there was going to be discussion about the Community Entertainment District. That would be the third and final reading if Council chooses to take action on it. She knew Mrs. Emahiser had scheduled a public meeting of sorts for that night.

There were a couple of things. One was that she thought it was very important that people understand that the underlining zoning does not change. She was getting to Mr. McIntire's questions. However, she thought it was very important for the community to understand that this does not mean that his home or other homes along Darrow Road were suddenly being rezoned to a different kind of zoning and that they would be stuck in the middle of that.

What it does allow though, was the boundaries roughly follow the Historic District as well as the land that we own. It does allow for some possible development that takes advantage of this whole corridor.

For example, the library is another public asset that is down that way. It allows them to maximize the economic development pull for the liquor licenses, as Mr. McIntire had mentioned, and to create, hopefully, a great asset to the community on the City Center site.

It does not mean that up along Darrow Road there is going to be restaurants. Anything that would not be allowed now would not be allowed in the Community Entertainment District.

Mr. McIntire asked if this legislation was to solely gain liquor licenses and if those liquor licenses were primarily looking to attract new business up here, why encompass this area that's unnecessary? Mayor Kline stated the idea was for development here at the City Center. However, it could be elsewhere.

Cellar 59 was a great example of an old historic home in Stow that was renovated and turned into a thriving business. There were businesses next to Mr. McIntire now. A Cellar 59 type business, and she wanted to be clear that she was only using them to illustrate her point, nothing else, would be the kind of business that may want to take advantage of a liquor license and maybe they would want to go south a little bit on Darrow Road.

Mr. McIntire stated according to that, that would require a variance because it's not a permitted use in that overlay district. If it's not a matter of zoning, if they were going to use zoning, that's not even a permitted use there.

Mayor Kline stated Mr. McIntire was in an R-B District. Mr. McIntire stated he was in the Darrow Road Overlay. Mayor Kline stated he was also in an R-B District. Mr. McIntire stated that he understood that. Mayor Kline stated so anything that is permitted would be allowed and the Community Entertainment District then would help facilitate that kind of development.

She stated maybe she was missing Mr. McIntire's question. Maybe she wasn't understanding him.

Mr. McIntire stated that he just didn't see the need for it. He read the article. Mr. Kurtz made a comment about the liquor licenses. It would be like one liquor license per five acres. Doing the math here, with the acreage that the City had in its application, which

is city-owned property, they could get 12 of them just based off of those numbers and what Mr. Kurtz had said.

Mayor Kline stated this was a public meeting. She respected that Mr. McIntire did not think it was necessary. However, we do.

She didn't know if this was probably the best venue for a back-and-forth question and answer period. She would be happy to spend some time with Mr. McIntire. She knew Mr. Kurtz would too. They could sit down and go over his questions more in detail and, hopefully, answer some of the questions that he had.

She respected his opinion. She respectfully disagreed with it. She would be happy to have the opportunity with Mr. Kurtz, because he could obviously explain the zoning issues with much more clarity than she could.

She appreciated Mr. McIntire raising this in this venue. However, she didn't think this was the right venue to really have the kind of conversation that she thought would be helpful to answer some of his questions.

Mr. McIntire stated the only other concern that he had was if this moves forward, the entire City of Stow was going to be able to vote to say whether Precinct 1-C could allow liquor or not, whereas right now, if he understood the legislation that was brought forward today, that precinct where that liquor license application was would be the only one that was going to vote on it. He asked if that was correct?

Mayor Kline stated that the Community Entertainment District allows for different ways of liquor licenses being assigned. Mr. McIntire stated he understood that. However, they were allowing the whole city to decide what's best for this particular precinct.

Mayor Kline stated that was state law. That was not her decision. Mr. McIntire stated he understood that. However, he felt that had to be taken into consideration. That was his personal property.

He understood that this wasn't the setting for this. However, it was the platform in which he had to speak.

He would be present for the public meeting, but right now he just didn't see the need to stretch that Entertainment District when they had the minimum required right here in their application.

Mayor Kline thanked Mr. McIntire for his input. She would be happy to talk to him further. They may still disagree at the end of that, but she would like him to at least have the information for the questions that he had.

Mr. McIntire stated all the information that he had was in the application that had the Mayor's name on it.

Mr. Shubert stated he was a resident of Hudson, a member of the City's Board of Tax Review and a candidate for the Ohio House of Representatives. Upon the request of private citizens, on Sunday, February 11, 2018, at 2:00 p.m., there will be a peaceful walk around City Hall on the sidewalk to show support for the ideals of tolerance and peace and making sure that Stow is a welcoming community for everyone no matter what their background is or where they come from or their history etc. They are encouraging people to wear maroon and gold to show pride in Stow.

She would be there. It was her understanding that Councilman Pribonic would be there. There may be other city officials present. While this is not a city event, she thought it was something that there is never a bad time or reason to promote those kinds of ideals. She fully supported the effort and will be proud to take part.

2. She would be addressing the Stow-Munroe Falls Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday, February 20th. That would serve as her annual State of the City Address. Mayor Armstrong, from the City of Munroe Falls, would also be delivering his annual State of the City Address.

Finance Director Baranek reported as follows:

1. Highlighted the following items from the Bill Listing:

Total: \$1,025,826.

Of that:

\$213,129 was for the bulk purchase of salt;
\$173,315 was for the bulk purchase of water; and
\$290,254 was for employee benefits
(police, fire and PERS pensions).

Since they had a large Bill Listing for the month of January, they didn't have any payroll expenditures on it that affected it.

Law Director Zibritosky reported as follows:

1. Wanted to update City Council and the City Administration on her office's efforts to implement a Case Management System that they had purchased last year in conjunction with Summit County and some other municipalities.

As of Wednesday, they were really close to getting everything to the point where they were just on tablets at court. She was very proud of her office. They had put in a ton of effort, especially over the last months, to make this happen.

She wanted to officially recognize Ann Nangle and Nicole Welsh, who had worked tirelessly, sometimes even coming-in before work hours and staying later, to make sure that this happened.
