Call to Order

Mr. Riehl called the meeting to order and Mayor Costello led the prayer and pledge of allegiance.

Comments from Other Persons Present

Dr. Roberta DePompei, the City's representative to the Summit County Public Health Department, stated that periodically she appeared before City Council to give them some reports about what's going on within the county regarding public health. She chose for tonight two issues around addiction to talk to them about.

First, as they were aware, the use of opioids continues to be a concern for the citizens of Summit County. The Public Health Department has put together a series of U-Tube videos about varying issues. Rather than listening to her for four minutes, she thought maybe they would rather watch the video of them.

She didn't touch video equipment so he hoped that the video would now play for them. (The wrong video came-up on the screen.) Dr. DePompei stated she didn't know what happened to the one about opioids, but rather than trying to find it and waste time this evening she would give them a little off-the-cuff summary and information.

Summit County does shine as one of the three largest counties for opioid use in the state. However, there have been many opportunities to make changes for people who have this disease.

They knew that the majority of people that are addicted are addicted not from street use but from actual prescription use. It is considered by the Public Health Department to be an illness for people who need assistance.

In our community and county they have two projects running. One of them is called Project DAWN. It is a distribution of NARCAN kits to anybody in the county who wishes to receive them. The other is Summit Safe, which is a program that exchanges needles for clean needles.

There are three locations, all in the Akron area, one on West Market, one on South Arlington and one on Kenmore Boulevard. They are open weekly for both of these programs.

This year Project DAWN has distributed at this point in time about 950 NARCAN kits. They can document that there have been 215 reported overdose reversals. Therefore, they knew that this project is providing some sort of support for individuals who need that assistance.

Summit Safe has a weekly average of 75-80 participants. Some are new each week; some are returning individuals. They receive sterile needles. They have the opportunity to speak with counselors. They also are offered but not required to have HIV screening and Hepatitis C testing.

They have some really nice programs that are available in the county to all of their members. Certainly Stow is not excluded from individuals who have these needs.

Another program that was just granted to the department is a \$1.5 million project. They will be testing two different intervention programs for individuals who are addicted. This is a three-year program to determine scientifically with a lot of data if these programs are actually working or not.

So they had a lot to be proud of in Summit County for the concern for our citizens who are addicted to opioids.

Her second topic is Tobacco 21. It is a national initiative that is based on the desire to decrease exposure of 12 to 18 year olds to tobacco products and vaping.

Just tonight, on Channel 3, before she left her house, they were running a special on kids and vaping. She would give them that information in just a minute. However, the CDC and FDA have come out and said that we have children (adolescents) with developing brains and the use of vaping is becoming quite a concern for the development of those brains. They now have data that shows that this is impairing the development of our young people.

Like she had said, all of a sudden she was leaving the room and Channel 3 was reporting on their studies that they have been doing in the schools in Northeastern Ohio. They would be giving a larger report on that at 11:00 p.m. tonight. So she asked if Council Members were done with their meeting, they tune in to see what they have to say.

One thing that they had said that had actually shocked her, and she didn't think she could be shocked about this information, is that the Brunswick Schools are now doing prevention programs for vaping in the 3rd, 4th and 5th grades because they believe that middle school is too late to start educating these children about their concerns.

Also, the Principal of Richfield is very concerned and has spearheaded Tobacco 21 in Richfield because he has boxes and boxes of materials that he has confiscated from kids. He again is saying that the major concern is 12 to 14 year olds. So they know that that's a problem.

Another problem they have in Summit County is young women from the ages of 15 to 19 becoming pregnant and continuing to smoke. They have some of the highest numbers of children with low birth rates and health problems when born because of the smoking issue with their mothers.

So Tobacco 21 was devised as a program to deter young smokers. They know that 21 year olds do not supply tobacco and vaping to 12 and 14 year olds. However, they know that 18 year olds do.

Nationally they have close to 400 major cities and 6 states who have enacted these laws. In Ohio they have 20 cities that include Columbus and Cleveland that already have these laws. It is based in Public Health Departments regulating vendors. They license vendors to sell tobacco products. By the way, Stow has 23 vendors and one vaping store.

The Public Health Department would license and manage vendors much like they do restaurants, septic systems and wells. There is no involvement of individuals. There is no criminal activity that is given to anyone under age who purchases any type of tobacco. There is no cost to any city. There is also no police involvement.

Tobacco 21 is presently supported by our military. They have their own smoking cessation program that's been going on for the past 3-5 years. They have come to realize that active duty personnel are not as healthy if they are smokers. Their VA system reports years and years of individuals who have been smoking with lung cancer and other health related issues. So the military is in support of Tobacco 21.

What about Summit County? Kent, which she realized is not in Summit County but is their neighbor to the east, has enacted legislation. Also in Summit County the cities that have passed legislation are: Akron, Twinsburg, Norton, Mogadore and Richfield. In process are: Green (with their third reading), Hudson (with their first reading) and Barberton (which is in committee).

The Township Association passed a resolution last April which states that the County of Summit Council is to prohibit the sale of tobacco products and paraphernalia to those under the age of 21 within the unincorporated areas of the county. That

information and legislation is moving forward next month. As of October 1st, 57% of the vendors in Summit County are not selling to individuals under 21.

What about the City of Stow? Last April she and a member of the Public Health Department met with the Mayor, the Police Chief and the Law Director. They outlined a potential program for Stow. They were supportive of it. The Law Director drew up legislation.

At that time Donna Skoda, the Public Health Commissioner, and her asked to meet with City Council about Tobacco 21. At that time, the information that was given to them was that Commissioner Skoda was told no, that Council was not interested in meeting with her. Stow is the only municipality in Summit County to refuse to allow Commissioner Skoda to present Tobacco 21.

She was saddened by what happened and she really hoped that there was a miscommunication last spring when they asked to meet with City Council. She was their representative and both she and the Commissioner were told no.

She was hoping that the Commissioner would in the future ask to meet with City Council again and that they would be willing to allow them to present Tobacco 21 to all of them because it's an important issue for the youth of our community.

Mrs. Weaver stated on November 3rd they would be having a second Awareness Walk for Open Carry for Stow. All Second Amendment Supporters are encouraged to attend. People do not need to be gun owners in order to attend. Simply peoples' presence is enough. This is a peaceful walk.

The gift cards are especially helpful because many of the Veterans at Freedom House don't have much clothing, etc. and they allow them to provide resources to get what they need.

She wanted to invite any and all members of Stow City Council that would be interested in attending this walk and any off-duty firemen, police officers or city employees.

City Officials' Reports

Mayor Costello reported as follows:

Mr. Pribonic stated this past weekend they had a fantastic celebration for Kourageous Keith. He wanted to thank the people involved. There would be other accolades coming in the future. He especially wanted to thank Mr. Wren and both the Fire and Police Departments.

It was nothing but a tearful day. It was probably one of the most exhausting hard days that he had ever seen for a little boy who suffered, but it was also probably one of the most joyous days.

He thought it really shined with Stow. Yesterday the United Kingdom picked-up the story. He thought they could all be very proud of the citizens. As a preliminary report, Stow so far has collected over \$10,000 for this young gentleman to help with his medical expenses.

It was a phenomenal project. It was put together in two weeks. People in the City of Stow have a lot to be proud of. He was very proud of that.

Mr. Razor stated he voted not to suspend the rules. They dealt with something similar 3-4 years ago with connecting the general employees with the union employees in terms of raises and the retroactive nature of those. He was out-in-front in opposing retroactive raises. Ultimately they decided against doing that by a narrow vote if he remembered right.

We live in a different city than we did back 3-4 years ago financially and economically. Circumstances have changed. He voted not to suspend the rules because he was still deciding. This was one of those issues to him that while it was smart to collapse our Committee and Council Meetings into the same night, there are certain decisions that can't be made in a snap. To him this was one of them.

He was open-minded. He appreciated the input from the employees who had reached out to him and their bosses. If he has to vote on it this evening, it is a no. Give him time and it may not be. It is just one of those things where the burden of proof is always on the advocate of the legislation. He is just teetering on the fence and would appreciate the normal course of giving it maybe two readings.

Mr. Pribonic stated for everyone who is not familiar, in the City they have a me-too provision. He asked Mr. Earle to explain what me-too would be to the other unions. Mr. Earle stated that everybody gets the same raise. That is the entire concept.

Mr. Pribonic stated so when everything is said and done that is the case. This is a group that is really not represented by anybody except themselves exclusively. If the other organized employees are deserving of it, then so are the other ones that work hard every day and supply the services that they all relied upon. If the vote is taken tonight, he would say yes.

Mr. Riehl asked if there were any other units that were still bargaining? Mr. Earle stated yes. Mr. Riehl asked what the intent was? They passed ordinances for the other unions. If the Gold Unit comes back with a higher amount, what would happen with the rest of them? Mr. Earle stated nothing for 2018. That is all Council is committing to this evening.
