Call to Order

Mr. Riehl called the meeting to order and Mr. Rasor led the prayer and pledge of allegiance.

Dr. DePompei stated that she was Stow's representative to the Summit County Public Health Department. She passed out a Community Report, a copy of which is attached to these minutes. She stated that the Mayor had a flash drive with this report on it as well, so if anyone was interested in reproducing them, they could.

The population of Stow right now is about 35,000 people. There are 3.2% of families and 5.6% of individuals living below the poverty level. If you do the math on that, it comes out to about 1,950 individuals in the City of Stow who are living below the poverty level.

They had seen a report in Summit County that said that the employment rate has gone down. It was at 6.4%. Now it was something like 4.9%. However, one of the things that was pointed out at their meeting was that while additional people are working, they are not working at a sustainable living rate.

They still have a number of people who are making poverty level (\$26,400 for four family members). So while they have income, they are spending about half of that income for housing and having great difficulty. Even though they are working, they still remain on our public rolls for services.

Across the bottom of the report are the top five services that the City of Stow has used from the Summit County Health Department. They are: food services, home sewage, mosquito control, housing complaints and dental.

They do have free dental services in Summit County Public Health at the Fairview Building for anybody in the county, but especially for impoverished members. If people can get there, they can receive free basic dental services. That was one of the major things that they were using in Stow.

On one of the back pages it talks about the Youth Risk Behavior Study. Five years ago they surveyed the middle school and high school students. They just completed that survey again. Stow students at the middle school and high school were involved in this survey.

It was looking at and asking questions about unintentional injuries and violence, sexual behaviors and sexually transmitted infections, alcohol and other drug use, tobacco use, unhealthy dietary behaviors, obesity, asthma and inadequate physical activity.

That information is starting to come out now. They didn't have it in full form, but as it comes out she is going to bring it to Council because she thought it is interesting, especially since the Stow kids were involved.

Also there is information about the state of the county's health. She pointed out that adults diagnosed with high blood pressure are one-third of the population. Adults with a body mass index of 30 are about 30% of the population. Excessive alcohol is about 20%. Smoking is 23%. The social determinants here for households still receiving public assistance is about 20%.

They had had a nice article in the paper about some of the things that Stow is doing about the poverty level. She felt they should be very proud of that.

There is a program at Summit County Public Health on Monday about violence in youth. It is at 10:00 a.m. at the Fairview Building. If anybody in Stow is interested in youth violence, they are invited attend that meeting.

Mayor Pribonic thought this was an exciting evening. It was always neat to see our students perform excellently in sports or in their studies. He had talked to the Administration several times and said that both qualify on both fronts.

The talent that we have in our City is amazing. He knew they are all proud of them. Tonight besides the Commendations that Mr. Riehl was going to present to two individuals, they would be putting-up signage recognizing these achievements when people come into the city.

This is a heck of an accomplishment. They had already traced down the addresses so they could put the signs up closest to their addresses. They wanted everyone to see it. They were proud of them. He knew they were proud of themselves, as they should be. The signs would be hanging at the entrances of the City.

Mayor Pribonic congratulated both individuals for their accomplishments. He thought that both individuals should be recognized.

Mr. Razor stated this was an outstanding thing for our city and certainly for Daniel's family. He had wrestled for a couple of years in high school, so he had a little bit closer idea of what he went thru to achieve what he did.

Wrestling is the most grueling thing that a human can go thru at that age. To be as good as he is and be in the middle weight class where there is a lot more competition is amazing.

He had been one of three. There were like two guys in the whole school that could be in his weight class. However, Daniel was against the best in his school, the best in the district and was one of the top five in the state.

He could keep rambling on about how much this means and how hard he had worked, however, he thought he had made his point.

Mr. D'Antonio congratulated Daniel. This was impressive. He had wrestled too, but you never heard his name in a school record.

It is amazing what Daniel had to go thru. Mike said it best – it is a grueling sport. You guys work very hard seven days a week 365 days a year. It's pretty impressive. They had a pretty good track record in that neighborhood.

Mr. Lowdermilk congratulated Daniel. This is a great accomplishment. He asked what grade Daniel was in? Daniel stated he was a junior this year.

Mr. Lowdermilk stated so he had one more year. He looked forward to presenting another Commendation next year for maybe first place.

He congratulated him for a job well done.

Mr. Riehl stated Daniel lives in Ward I, which is his ward. He congratulated Daniel on making the ward proud and the city proud for all that he had done.

He wished her good luck in her future endeavors. He knew she would be up here again.

Mr. D'Antonio congratulated Jillian. For a freshman to win a state title in anything was just amazing. The fact that she finished third in district and first in state was awesome. He congratulated her again on her accomplishments.

Mr. Lowdermilk congratulated Jillian. This is quite an accomplishment. He asked her what grade she was in? Jillian states she was a freshman.

Mr. Lowdermilk stated we may have to create a lot of space for her accomplishments. He congratulated her again.

Mr. Costello stated he couldn't say anything about Daniel because he knew very little about wrestling. However, he knew it took a lot of effort and talent to get where he got.

He knew a lot more about bowling than he did about wrestling. He knew it takes an extreme amount of skill to get where Jillian got.

He also commended the Stow-Munroe Falls High School's Athletic Department for bringing up fine, challenging individuals.

Mr. Razor asked Jillian how she became such a prodigy? It is so incredible to think that you would be the best in the state and still have three more years of improvement.

He encouraged her to keep getting better and better and to make herself somebody that three decades from now girls everywhere around the state will want to emulate her.

City Officials' Reports

Mayor Pribonic reported as follows:

1. This morning Mr. Trenner and him went to a ConnectsUs Meeting which was very informative. ConnectsUs is joining both our students in our school system and businesses. They aren't just singular for Stow. They are actually in Summit County.
2. Last Tuesday in a meeting with the Cities of Stow and Munroe Falls and the School District in cooperation with the Stow-Munroe Falls Nice Group they brought out addressing issues that they don't really realize that they have in Stow.

Everybody knows about Bulldog Bags. They had put themselves on the map with it. He knew Mr. Razor had donated graciously to them. He knew what a great program that was.

However, unfortunately, as they found out back in December, there are 25 families at least that are actually homeless. That is a startling statistic. That didn't mean that they are living under bridges or in the parks, it means that they are probably under-employed or still looking for employment.

He vowed when he took office to go ahead with collaboration. The Schools, the City and the Nice Group all came together with the help of their Guidance Counselors, Mr. Bratten and several others to pull this feat off.

People are going to be seeing a trifold out there. Everybody is going to receive that trifold. It is more of an education piece. They want to educate people to helping people.

If anybody is interested, April 15th thru the 26th at Stow City Hall and the Safety Building, Munroe Falls City Hall and the Akron General Wellness Center there is a program called Drop Your Drawers. That is the collection of new, packaged, clean underwear that our students in our schools will be able to use. There is definitely a need for that.

It is a somber thought, but this is what Stow is. He thought they could be very proud of all the initiatives coming out from the Schools, the City and our residents.

3. This Saturday there will be an Easter Egg Hunt at the Stadium at 10:30 a.m. They had plenty of eggs and candy. The Easter Bunny would be there.

It is supposed to be beautiful weather. It is on artificial turf and fenced in so nobody would be running away. He hoped to see everyone there this Saturday.

Assistant Law Director Chaplin reported as follows:

1. Ms. Chaplin introduced herself. She stated she was standing in tonight for Law Director Mackin. There was nothing to report at this time, but she would be happy to answer any questions.

Chief of Staff/Service Director Wren reported as follows:

1. We are out with our consortium for salt prices for next winter. As you will recall, last year we got a terrible price. We voted as part of our consortium to go out to bid much earlier this year. Hopefully, by the next Council Meeting he should have the results of that bid.

City Engineer McCleary reported as follows:

1. Construction season is upon us. They are finishing up the waterline and putting in sidewalks this week along Graham Road. Next week the railroad tracks will be taken out on Graham Road. The S.R. 8 Expressway Project is going strong.

The construction companies have asked that people be very careful in construction zones, especially on the S.R. 8 Expressway. The Stow Police Department is trying to enforce our ordinances as much as possible, but the construction companies have noticed that people do not slowdown in construction zones. It's a problem throughout the state. He asked people to be very careful and watch out for the workers.
